DISTRICTS WARN PARENTS ABOUT THE DANGERS OF VAPING

(Article published by the New Jersey School Boards Association)

With a growing number of students participating in vaping - smoking e-

cigarettes often laced with addictive nicotine and sweet flavors — the New Jersey School Boards Association will be posting a series of videos to help inform parents and educators about the phenomenon.



The first video in the series is available below, featuring Cristina Martins of Tobacco Free for a Healthy New Jersey and the Southern New Jersey Perinatal Cooperative.

The Centers for Disease Control has issued a warning about vaping.

"Because your brain is still developing, scientific studies show that it isn't safe for you to use any tobacco product that contains nicotine, including ecigarettes," states the warning by the



Centers for Disease Control's Office on Smoking and Health. "Whether you get nicotine from an e-cigarette or a cigarette, it's still risky."

Electronic cigarettes are increasingly popular among middle and high school students, according to an article titled, "What Every Parent Needs to Know about Vaping," published by New Jersey Family magazine.

8 SIGNS YOUR CHILD MAY BE VAPING

- You detect a sticky-sweet scent
- A weird looking USB drive or pen is always in reach
- You find discarded atomizers, pods or organic cotton balls
- Agitation or irritability (if they can't get their fix)
- They're calmer after a trip to the bathroom or their room
- Dry-mouth and nosebleeds caused by dehydration
- Mouth sores and a smoker's cough
- They're always asking for money (it's an expensive habit)

What drugs can be smoked out of an electronic cigarette?

Here are some of the drugs that can be smoked out of an electronic cigarette:

- Liquid THC
- Bath Salts
- Flakka
- Hash Oil
- Synthetic marijuana (Spice or K2)
- Psychedelics (DMT)

Teens and young adults often explore ways of getting high without detection. Electronic cigarettes have become a way for teens and young adults to get high discreetly, often avoiding detection from parents, teachers and law enforcement officials. When teenage substance abuse goes undetected, it can lead to devastating consequences.

No school is immune to the trend. "It's happening at Millburn. It's happening everywhere," William Miron, principal at Millburn High School, told the publication.

Experts say high-achieving, stressed teens seem especially drawn to nicotine's effect, making the habit pervasive throughout New Jersey middle and high schools.

What's Vaping? In short, it's inhaling the vapor produced by heating an eliquid (or e-juice). The liquid is typically nicotine (though not always) mixed with chemicals and minty or fruity flavorings. Personal delivery devices look less like smoking paraphernalia and more like elegant pens and unassuming flash drives that can be decorated with stickers, skins and other flair.

Because their vapors are essentially odorless and invisible, students are finding it easy to pull hits wherever—at their lockers, in the school bathroom or even in class when their teachers' backs are turned. Juul, the e-cigarette brand that so powerfully dominates the youth market has become a verb, uses proprietary e-liquid pods in a sleek piece of tech that recharges via USB port.

Over 2.1 million youth are current e-cig users, and 43 percent who used e-cigs said they tried them because of the appealing flavors, according the Center for Disease Control's 2018 Truth Initiative.

More students are using e-cigarettes on a regular basis. Twenty-eight percent of high school e-cigarette users said they vaped for 20 or more days during a month in 2018 – a significant increase from 2017 when only 20 percent of e-cigarette users reported vaping for 20 or more days per month.

What does the South Amboy Public Schools policy say about vaping?

"Students are not permitted to smoke, including inhaling the burning or vapor of a lighted cigar, cigarette, pipe, electronic smoking device or any other matter or substance which contains tobacco at any time in school buildings, on school property, on school buses, or at a school-sponsored trip or activity off school premises. Chewing tobacco is also specifically prohibited. Students are not to carry cigarettes or other smoking materials such as electronic smoking devices, tobacco, pipes or cigarette rolling papers while on school property. Discovery of such items will warrant an immediate drug test/screening."






ELEMENTARY SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

Winter Track 2018-2019

The winter track team had a very successful campaign this season in just its fifth year of existence. Over the course of five meets, the team posted numerous personal records (PRs) and school records. This season saw the emergence of a very strong freshman class led by Rafael Albarran, Joe Jamolawicz and Guinevere

Kennedy. Rafael, who was the GMC Middle School Champion in the mile last spring, debuted with a stellar year finishing as the fastest freshman mile runner in all of Group 1 New Jersey with a PR time of 4:51. Rafael's time is also the fastest indoor freshman mile time in school history. Joe Jamolawicz had a great season smashing his PR in the mile by over 30 seconds and running an 11:47 for the two mile. Guinevere Kennedy established a new PR every time she stepped on the track and ended the season with a 6:26 mile and a 13:57 two mile. Junior Captain Maryann Walsh had a great year and qualified for states in the two mile for the second time in her indoor career with a new PR and school record of 12:37. Maryann also broke the school record in the 800 meters giving her ownership of every girls school record in distances 800 meters and up. Junior Abe Calderon also had an exceptional year by running sub 5 in the mile 3 times, including a team best for the season 4:50 which ranks him 5th all time in



school history. Other runners who had particularly successful years include Bryan Pena in events ranging from the 400 meters to the mile, Nashari Payano, Nick Baginski, Nathan Vastey and Kamal Davis in the sprints, Jessica Henry and Captain Jack Lukie in middle distance events, and Charlie Smith and Spencer Kennedy in the 800 meters and the mile. Congratulations to the team on a great season and good luck as they gear up for spring track. Season's best are listed below (SR= School Record).


